Komodo dragons are the largest species of lizard in the world, capable of growing up to 10 feet (3 meters) in length. They are native to Indonesia and can be found on the islands of Komodo, Rinca, Flores, Gili Motang, and Padar. Komodo dragons have a highly developed sense of smell and use their forked tongues to detect scents, helping them locate carrion miles away. Despite their size, komodo dragons can run up to 13 miles per hour (20 km/h) and are excellent swimmers. These reptiles have venom glands loaded with toxins that reduce blood clotting in their prey, which aids in taking down large animals. Komodo dragons engage in a ritualistic "wrestling match" during mating season to gain access to females, with the winner getting the prize. Juvenile komodo dragons often roll in feces to avoid being eaten by adults, as the smell deters potential predators. Their saliva contains a mix of bacteria, once thought to be their primary weapon, and serves as an additional tool for incapacitating prey. Females can lay up to 30 eggs at a time, which they hide in burrows or mound using dirt and vegetation for protection. Continue the lines of the torso and depict the long tail that is bent. Draw the front paws. The lower part of the torso depict two wide paws. Add the hind paws. Sketch out two hind legs. The feet are large and wide. Correct inaccuracies. Carefully remove unnecessary lines. Color the komodo dragon. Use brown for the body. Color the eye orange, the pupil black, and add highlights. The Komodo dragon appeared on our planet many millions of years ago, but this animal is currently endangered. The Komodo dragon is considered a very dangerous animal because its bite is poisonous. With its long, strong tail, the Komodo dragon is capable of knocking down a large animal, such as a buffalo or a deer. The giant monitor lizard is very voracious and can eat a large amount of food at one time. This is a truly amazing animal, and we hope you enjoy drawing it. Time needed: 1 hourHow to Draw a Komodo Dragon Prepare the base. Sequentially draw three circles of different sizes, with the help of which you will determine the location of the main parts of the body of the Komodo dragon. Depict the back and limbs. Draw a long line along the top edge. The line should connect all the circles and smoothly pass into the tail. Determine the position of the front and hind legs. Add the lower part of the torso. Draw a smooth line along the bottom edge, just like you did in the previous step. In this way you will draw the outline of the neck, belly and lower part of the tail. Sketch out the front of the head. Draw the front of the head on the left side of the drawing. Add the outline of the forehead, nose and lower jaw. Depict the mouth with a smooth line. Detail the head and torso. Depict the small eye, nostrils and with a short rounded line draw the ear hole. Draw thin jagged lines on the dragon's body to represent the folds. Draw the front paw. Add the volume to the front paw. Draw a few smooth rounded lines, use the auxiliary lines that you prepared in advance as a guide. Depict the bottom of the paws. Add the foot and long, curved toes that have a spiky outline. Also depict the lower part of the paw, which is located farther from us. Sketch out the hind paw. Using a few smooth lines, draw a half-bent hind leg. With short strokes, draw the folds on the skin. Add the bottom of the hind leg. The feet on the hind legs have a different shape than on the front. The foot is wide, and the toes are short, but just as sharp. Correct inaccuracies. All elements of the body are already drawn and at this stage you can remove the auxiliary lines, correct errors and make the outline clearer. Color the Komodo dragon. Use a dark gray to color the body of the Komodo Dragon. Do not forget to add shadows where it is necessary. Now you have learned to draw a Komodo dragon. If you want to improve your drawing, then add the environment. For example, draw stones on which the dragon stands and green plants. Show your creative imagination! Use light, smooth strokes to begin. Step 1: Draw two circles as guides for the komodo dragon's body. The circles don't have to be perfect. They're just guides. Komodo dragons have long bodies, so don't place the circles too close together or you'll end up with a short dragon. The gap between the two circles should be about the same width as the first circle. Place the second circle a bit lower too. Step 2: Draw two curved lines that connect the two circles to finish up the guide for the komodo dragon's body. Step 3: Draw another circle on the upper left side as a guide for the komodo dragon's head. This circle should be about one-third the size of the first one. The higher up you place the circle, the longer the komodo dragon's neck will be. Step 4: Draw a long arc on the left side of the head as a guide for the komodo dragon's muzzle. Step 5: Draw a few more lines as guides for the komodo dragon's neck and tail. A couple of lines that connect the head to the body make up the neck. Draw a long line on the right side of the body for the tail. Begin with drawing a medium oval and a D-Shaped figure. Now make a base for the face. Draw a C and a small circle. Now join them all and make the base for the tail. Make the feet and the legs. Enhance the fingers. Now make the spot across the body and the eyes.
